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Cap-and-Trade Passes in the House of Representatives

Cap-and-Trade is a term you have probably heard of recently. Under cap-and-trade, the government would set a “cap” on the total carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions that would be allowed. Companies would be issued permit allocation allowances to cover a certain amount of their emissions. If not enough allowances are issued to a company, they would be required to purchase them on the open market which could be very costly. Energy costs could rise dramatically. Public Power is concerned about our environment, but we are also concerned about the long term economic impact this legislation could create.

In a historic vote in the United States House of Representatives cap-and-trade legislation, the American Clean Energy and Security Act (H.R.2454) was narrowly passed by a vote of 219-212. With its passage, the House version of the measure will now move on to the Senate, where once again grassroots support will be vital to ensure Nebraska’s Public Power message is heard.

The Nebraska Rural Electric Association Grassroots Initiative involves working in partnership with our member-systems directors, managers, employees and ultimately our consumers to increase our understanding of the issues affecting the electric industry and advocate on these important issues. I recently attended the NREA Grassroots Coordinator Training in Lincoln, NE. The reason I volunteered for this added responsibility is not for a lack of things to do. I felt that it is an important and worthwhile effort. While at the training session, I realized how much there is to learn about the legislative process and plan to do a lot of reading. We have very capable and passionate people at work for us at the Nebraska Rural Electric Association. They are attending the hearings at the Capitol daily to lobby for us all, to do what is best for electric utilities and their consumers in the state of Nebraska. But they can only do so much. There is strength in numbers and we all have a role to play. There are currently many bills under review that will ultimately affect each of

us who is a ratepayer.

While messages from electric cooperative leaders carry a lot of weight on Capitol Hill, nothing compares to the voices of the members themselves; the 42 million hard-working citizens that will ultimately foot electric bills impacted by federal climate change policy.

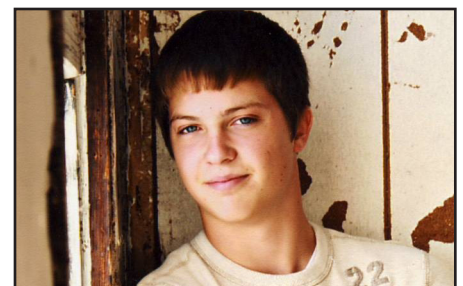
Phil Wiebelhaus Awarded Martindale Scholarship

QUICK BEEF BUNS

- ¾ lb ground beef
- 2 Tablespoon green peppers
- 2 Tablespoon minced dried onion
- ½ cup bread crumbs
- ¼ barbecue sauce
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 8 ounce crescent roll dough
- Mozzarella cheese
- 1 egg yolk



Cook beef, pepper and onion in skillet over medium heat until brown. Remove from heat and stir in bread crumbs, barbecue sauce and salt. Set aside.

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Separate crescent roll dough in 4 rectangles on lightly floured board. Roll dough in 8 x 4 rectangles-cut crosswise in half.

Place 2 tablespoons of meat mixture on each half. Top with some mozzarella. Pull corners of dough toward the center and twist. Pinch to seal. Place buns on greased cookie sheet. Repeat with the rest. Makes 8 servings.

In small cup, beat egg yolk and 1 teaspoon of water with fork until blended. Brush top of buns.

Bake 10-15 minutes or until golden brown.

July 2009 EnergyWise Tip: "Operate your appliances when energy demand is low."

How and when you use electric energy can make a difference.

Nebraska's electric system must be flexible to supply reliable power to homes, businesses, and industries under a wide variety of conditions.

This takes a complex system of power plants, substations, transmission and distribution lines to get energy to where it needs to go. As an energy consumer, there are many things you can do to reduce en-

ergy usage, particularly during hot days in the summer months when demand for electricity is typically at its highest.

These EnergyWise tips include:

When temperatures top 90° F, find ways to reduce your energy usage from 3 p.m. to 8 p.m. when energy usage is typically at its highest.

Raise your thermostat to a higher setting and turn on fans.

Close drapes on windows that face the sun.

Grill supper outdoors. Use your micro-

wave instead of the stove top or oven.

Delay dish washing and laundry until after 8 p.m.

Unplug appliances and shut off lights that are not in use.

Do any baking early in the morning before it gets hot outside.

Shower early in the morning or later in the evening.
