### STAY SAFE WHILE HUNTING


As you prepare for hunting season, keep in mind that along with general hunting safety, electrical safety should also be a top priority.

You might be preoccupied and excited about the big hunt, but be sure to look up and out for power lines. Never place a tree stand near a power line. Contact with the power line, utility pole, or related equipment can alter the path to ground, sending electricity through anyone or anything that comes too close to or in direct contact with the power source.

In addition, do not shoot near or toward power lines, utility poles. transformers or substations. Stray bullets or pellets could damage equipment, possibly interrupting electric service. Even more concerning, they could drop a power line to the ground, causing a hazardous scenario: those who get within 50 feet of the downed line could be shocked or electrocuted.

**CKPPD** reminds hunting enthusiasts of these electrical safety tips:

- · Familiarize yourself with the area before heading out to hunt. Take note of power lines and equipment, especially when hunting in densely wooded areas.
- Observe all signs or postings that advise electrical safety, especially when scouting out a location for your tree stand.



- Do not use power poles to support a tree stand.
- Do not put a tree stand near a power line or pole.
- . Be in the habit of looking up and out for power lines and do not come within 10 feet of an overhead line or pole when setting up or taking down a stand.
- · Never climb a utility pole.

Please report any damage to a line or other related equipment to us so that we can address it. Although we perform routine maintenance, damage may not be noticed until an outage occurs.

Of course, always take the time to observe general hunting safety measures as well. Wear blaze orange and have a first aid kit handy. Stay safe out there!



When decorating outside, look up and look out. Never throw holiday lights or other decorations into trees near power lines. Be especially careful when working near power lines attached to your house. Keep ladders, equipment, and yourself at least 10 feet away from power lines.

# Ready Your Home FOR WINTER

Prepare your home for winter now to ensure safety, efficiency and comfort. Here's a checklist you can use.



#### **INSPECT HEATING SYSTEM:**

- Have your heating system professionally serviced.
- Replace air filters if needed.
- Ensure vents and radiators are unblocked for efficient heat distribution.

#### TEST AND MAINTAIN SMOKE AND **CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS:**

- Replace batteries in smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.
- Test detectors to ensure they function properly.

#### PREPARE PIPES AND WATER SUPPLY:

- Insulate exposed pipes to prevent freezing.
- Drain and shut off outdoor faucets and irrigation systems.
- Know the location of water shut-off valve in case of emergency.

#### PREPARE YOUR HOME'S EXTERIOR:

- Clear gutters and downspouts to prevent ice dams.
- Trim trees away from the house to avoid damage.
- Ensure downspouts extend away from the foundation.
- Service and store equipment such as lawnmowers and trimmers.
- Gather winter tools such as snow shovels and ice melt.

#### **INCREASE HOME ENERGY EFFICIENCY:**

- Seal gaps at windows and doors with weatherstripping or caulk.
- Set ceiling fans to rotate clockwise to circulate warm air.
- Lower your thermostat a few degrees to save on heating costs.
